PROVIDER REIMBURSEMENT INFORMATION

- Any mental health provider listed below can serve victims who are applicants with CalVCB.
- As the payor of last resort, CalVCB reimburses crime-related expenses that are not fully paid by insurance companies or other sources.
- When submitting the first bill include verification of licensure and a completed IRS Form W-9.

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CalVCB TREATMENT DOCUMENTATION


- Complete a CalVCB Treatment Plan (TP) by the fourth session.
- The TP must be maintained in the provider's client file and submitted to CalVCB upon request.
- If additional sessions are needed, the provider should complete the CalVCB Additional Treatment Plan (ATP) and submit it along with the TP to CalVCB.

INITIAL SESSION LIMITS	WHO MAY RECEIVE THE BENEFIT
40 SESSION HOURS	Direct victim (minor and adult)
	Immediate family members of homicide victims
30 SESSION HOURS	Primary caretakers of a direct victim who was a minor at the time of the crime
	Good Samaritan
15 SESSION HOURS	Adult derivative victim*
	Post-crime caretaker
5 SESSION HOURS CASE MANAGEMENT	Direct and Derivative victims

^{*} A derivative victim is someone who, at the time of the crime, is a child, spouse, registered domestic partner, sibling, parent, grandparent or grandchild of the victim. This includes someone living in the household of the victim, a person who previously lived in the household for two years, a primary caretaker of a minor victim, fiancé or family member who witnessed the crime.



OTHER WAYS CalVCB CAN HELP

In addition to Mental Health Treatment, CalVCB can assist victims of violent crime with other services, including but not limited to:

- Medical and dental treatment
- Funeral and burial expenses
- Income Loss

- Relocation
- Residential security
- Medical equipment, if lost or stolen
