### Who Qualifies for Compensation

Victims of crimes involving physical injury, emotional injury due to threat of physical injury, or death may qualify for compensation through CaIVCB.

### Reaching All Populations

CaIVCB provides applications in 18 languages. Applicants are not required to disclose their race.

Victims must be a California resident at the time of the crime, or a non-resident who is victimized in California.

United States citizenship is not required to apply for financial help.

### TOP COMPENSATION CATEGORIES

*CaIVCB assists victims of many crimes and can compensate up to \$70,000.*

## ***County Assistance***

Victims may apply for benefits directly, or with the assistance of an advocate, attorney, social worker, family member, or friend.

There are Victim Witness Assistance Centers in each county statewide.

CaIVCB also contracts with 16 of the 58 California counties to provide victims services and benefits to eligible applicants. These contracts are generally with the county District Attorney's offices.

## ***Trauma Recovery Centers***

Since 2014, CaIVCB has awarded grants to Trauma Recovery Centers (TRCs) to provide trauma-informed mental health treatment and case management to underserved crime victims who may not be eligible for victim compensation or may be fearful of reporting a crime to law enforcement.

## ***CaIVCB Funding***

In Fiscal Year 2022-23, CaIVCB's budget appropriation was \$201.7 million. CaIVCB is funded through the Restitution Fund, the State General Fund, Federal Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Funds, Safe Neighborhood and School Fund, and other funds.

The Restitution Fund receives monies from restitution fines and orders, penalty assessments levied on persons convicted of crimes, and traffic offenses. VOCA is federal grant funding that supports state victim compensation programs. The Safe Neighborhood and Schools Fund exclusively funds TRCs.
